New Zealand Trip Report

It was a small but enthusiastic group that left rainy San Jose in April to explore down under on an IBM Retirement Club trip. It was fall in New Zealand and we had lovely weather almost the whole trip.

Our arrival in Auckland brought us to the beautiful Sky City Hotel at the base of the highest structure in the Southern Hemisphere. From the panoramic top of that space needle, the reason this is called the "City of Sails" was clear. This is a cosmopolitan city situated in the midst of beautiful waterways with many sailboats and yachts in the harbors. There is much to see in this, the largest city in New Zealand. We visited the highlights of the city and then went on an unusual tour of the former septic tanks of the city than have been transformed into a wonderful replica of the South Pole as well as an aquarium! We met penguins face to face!

Our group was very lucky to have a bus that seated 48 for our small group thus allowing each of us to have a window seat...on either side! Our next stop was Rotorua, which is the center of the fascinating Maori culture. In addition to learning about the Maori life at their culture center, we attended a "Hangi" (Maori hosted dinner) where George became one of the fierce warriors for a short time! Just ask him about it! We also marveled at the landscape in this area with hot geysers, boiling mud pots and a Redwood forest! This is a really remarkable area. Did I mention the Glow Worm Caves? What a weird but beautiful place that was!

We traveled through areas that were used to film "Lord of the Rings" and the scenery was incredible! The many trout streams called to the men on the bus. The clarity of the water was extreme. Mountain tops were snow covered with many ski fields evident. Still, it was very comfortable with only a sweater. Wellington is the capital of New Zealand and the harbor we sailed from by ferry to the South Island. It was smooth sailing across the Cook Strait and into the Queen Charlotte Sound to Picton. Every time a change is made to any file on your computer the differences between the new and old versions of the file are saved and compressed. The entire history of a file's changes is available through a very simple user interface. With this package, Enterprise type archival technology is scaled to the small business network and standalone computer. Katchall Archive uses some of your disk storage along with sophisticated techniques to capture and compress in real time the changes required to recover each version of a file.
